Tatauranga Umanga Māori quarterly Data Collection

Coverage of our population

The population of businesses covered in Tatauranga Umanga Māori quarterly release is just one subset of Māori businesses – Māori authorities. Māori authorities are defined as businesses that receive, manage, and/or administer assets held in common ownership by iwi and Māori. All figures are actual values and are not adjusted for seasonal effects. The relatively small population of businesses in this release means changes published here may not reflect entire industry movements.

Māori authorities are identified via data from Inland Revenue (IR).

TUM - Business Financial Data Variables (Published)

Name	Description	Range
Sales	<p>Sales</p> <p>This includes sales of goods (whether manufactured, processed, or traded), sales of services (including repair services) and other operating income such as manufacturing, processing, and management fees, rental and leasing income, royalties, and patent fees. Non-operating income is excluded, such as interest, dividends, government grants and subsidies.</p>	
Purchases	<p>Purchases</p> <p>This includes purchases of goods, fuels, and materials (whether for production or resale), general expenses (such as advertising, freight, insurance, motor vehicle, rates, rent, repairs, utilities), management fees and payments to other businesses or divisions, payments to welfare and superannuation schemes (e.g., ACC, KiwiSaver), royalties and patent fees. Non-operating expenditure is excluded,...</p>	

TUM - Business Employment Data Variables (Published)

Name	Description	Range
Filled jobs	<p>Filled jobs</p> <p>This measure in the Business employment data is the average weekly filled jobs in the quarter. A filled job is defined as a continuing employer-employee relationship. The week is Monday to Sunday.</p>	
Total earnings	<p>Total earnings</p> <p>Total quarterly earnings refer to the earnings paid on a 'cash basis'. It covers the amount paid in the reference quarter. Quarterly earnings exclude retirement payments, redundancy payments, and employee benefits.</p>	

TUM - Overseas Merchandise Trade (OMT) Variables (Published)

Name	Description	Range
Commodity	<p>Commodity</p> <p>This term does not necessarily denote one particular item. In most cases a 'commodity' occupies a sub-group in the Harmonised System Classification. In some few cases it can mean a very broad group (such as kaimoana) or a fairly well-defined sub-group (such as wine).</p>	
Exports	<p>Exports</p> <p>Merchandise exports (excluding re-exports) are goods of domestic origin exported from New Zealand to another country.</p>

ANZSIC06

In tables 5 and 6, we combine industry groups to form the following broad groupings, based on the ANZSIC06 (Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 2006):

- primary industries (agriculture; forestry and fishing; mining)
- goods-producing industries (manufacturing; electricity, gas, water, and waste services; construction)
- other services industries (wholesale trade; retail trade; accommodation and food services; transport, postal and warehousing; information media and telecommunications; financial and insurance services; public administration and safety; education and training).

The following industries are also included in tables 5 and 6:

- Rental, Hiring and Real Estate Services
- Professional, Scientific and Technical Services
- Administrative and Support Services
- Health Care and Social Assistance
- Arts and Recreation Services
